The modern concept of the Seven Deadly Sins is linked to the works of the 4th century monk Evagrius Ponticus, who listed eight evil thoughts in Greek which were then translated into the Latin of Roman Catholic spiritual *pietas* (or Catholic devotions), as listed below:

- *Gula* (gluttony)
- *Fornicatio* (fornication, lust)
- *Avaritia* (avarice/greed)
- *Tristitia* (sorrow/despair)
- *Ira* (wrath)
- *Acedia* (acedia)
- *Vanagloria* (vainglory)
- *Superbia* (pride)

In AD 590, some years after Evagrius, Pope Gregory I revised this list to form the more common Seven Deadly Sins, by folding sorrow/despair into acedia, vainglory into pride, and adding extravagance and envy, while removing fornication from the list. In the order used by both Pope Gregory and by Dante Alighieri in his epic poem *The Divine Comedy*, the seven deadly sins are as follows:

1. luxuria (extravagance/lust)
2. gula (gluttony)
3. avaritia (avarice/greed)
4. Socordia (sloth/acedia)
5. ira (wrath)
6. invidia (envy)
7. superbia (pride)

The identification and definition of the seven deadly sins over history has been a fluid process and the idea of what each of the seven actually encompasses has evolved over time.
